An overview of SEN support at Hale

Pupils may move through these stages as the progress through their school career.

EHCP's

ASP's / SEN support

Pupils will be closely monitored and advice may be sought from external agencies such as paediatricians or psychologists.

If pupils require additional support beyond what is available within that year group, this is the stage at which pupils would be placed on the schools SEND list.

Some pupils may be identified by the class teacher as requiring some additional support. This may be met by adapting the classroom to meet their needs.

We provide quality first teaching, differentiated for all pupils. This is our main process for ensuring that the needs of all pupils are met.

Unless we are provided with prior knowledge, all pupils start their learning journey at the base of the triangle, where the necessary provisions are put in place for your child. The graduated approach is fluid and moves up and down the triangle, directed by the needs of the child or young person.



SEN Information for Parents SENDCo - Mrs Buckley

What are Special Educational Needs (SEN)?

'A child or young person has special educational needs (SEN) if they have a learning difficulty which calls for special educational provision to be made for them. A learning difficulty or disability is a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age.

Special educational provision means educational or training provision that is additional to, or different from, that made generally for others of the same age in main stream setting in England. Health care provision or social care provision which educates or trains a child or young person is to be treated as special educational provision 'Code of Practice 2014'.

Your child has been identified as having SEN as their development is:

- 1. Very different from that of their peers starting from a similar baseline.
- 2. Significantly slower than previous progress they have made.
- 3. Showing a widening gap between your child and their peers.
- 4. Need support to prevent a progress or developmental gap from growing wider.
- 5. Your child's ability to regulate their emotions and understand their feelings is difficult for them.

Your child's development in one or more of the following areas requires support.

- 1. Cognition and Learning
- 2. Sensory and Physical
- 3. Social, Emotional and Mental Health
- 4. Communication and Interaction



A Graduated Approach to SEN Support

You child's needs are considered on an individual basis and appropriate support is given and continuously reviewed. When a pupil has been identified as SEN we follow a graduated approach to supporting them.

<u>Stage 1</u>—Satisfactory progress is made and learning is managed though the classroom teaching .



<u>Stage 3</u> - A 'Personal Support Plan' is created for the child if concerns persist or outcomes are not met. Input will be required from class teacher, parent/carer and pupil. You should receive a copy of these from your child's class teacher. Interventions are put in place to support the child in meeting their outcomes.

<u>Stage 4</u> - If little or no progress is made, a discussion will take place between SENDCo, parent/carer and class teacher about future support for the child. Their progress will be discussed and outcomes updated.

<u>Stage 5</u> - If there continues to be little or no progress, an 'Additional Support Plan' will be created. We will closely monitor the child for 2 full terms, during which time there will be a series of meetings between SENDCo. parents/carers and class teacher.

<u>Stage 6</u> - At the end of the above process, we are able to decide if we move forward with a request for additional support or funding from the Local Authority in the forms of additional funding or an EHCP (educational health and care plan).
